MAYOR WOODWARD: Mayor's report. The first thing I have is that I just want to put this out to people. If anybody has any concerns or questions, I want everybody to know that they can reach out to me at any time. My contact information is on the website, my phone number and my email address. So, if anybody wants to get in contact with me, I'm more than willing to have a conversation with you or I can meet with you at the Administration Building if you want to talk to me in person. I am an open book. I have no problem meeting with anybody.
The second thing is that under new business tonight, I'll be asking for three appointments. The first one will be for Mike Sullivan to be appointed to the open Board of Public Affairs seat expiring December 31, 2025. The second one will be for Thomas Czoka to be appointed to the open Board of Zoning Appeals seat expiring August 13, 2029. And the third one will be for Rose Saborse to be appointed to the Board of Zoning Appeals seat expiring August 13, 2025. That's all I have.
Clerk's report?
MR. BLANK: I have no report, Mayor.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Bill? (NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Solicitor's report?
SOLICITOR RIES: No report, Mayor.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Matt? (NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Treasurer's report?
MR. EBLING: No report.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Thanks, George. Does anybody have any questions for George? (NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Board of Trustees of Public Affairs report?
MR. PETERSON: Yes. We did have our regular meeting today at 4:00 p.m. Also, next Wednesday we scheduled a special meeting with the Utility committee to review project funding.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Chris? (NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Village Engineer's report. Did he leave a report for us to read or anything?
MR. BLANK: No, he did not.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Okay. We'll move on then.
Special reports. Police Chief Brent Milhoan?
CHIEF MILHOAN: I have no report, Mayor.
MAYOR WOODWARD: Thanks, Brent. Does anybody have any questions for Brent? (NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

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CHIEF EASTHAM: Fire Chief Travis Eastham?
Yes, Mayor. We did receive a MARCS grant from the State of Ohio for MARCS radios. This is to replace an outdated MARCS base station radio in the station, two vehicle repeaters for areas where we don't have good coverage and we can run off the trucks, and two portables. It totaled \$16,811 and we have a zero match on that.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Thank you, Travis. Does anybody have any questions?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Planning and Zoning Administrator, Kellie Bordner?

MS. BORDNER: Yes, Mayor. Thank you. In the past couple of weeks, the Planning and Zoning Office has received several inquiries on industrial properties for business such as stem training and educational supply warehousing, hydrogen fuel cell manufacturing and pharmaceutical warehousing, to name a few.
We have also been in communication with the contractor on the renovations at 1721 Lyntz Road. This property was on our demolition list, but the property owner opted to renovate and has invested approximately \$30,000 to \$40,000 in fixing it up. It should be completed within the next month. If it passes inspection, we will move forward with asking that the Trumbull County Health Department Board remove the unfit for human habitation status so the property owner can then sell it.
And just as a reminder, there will be a work session before the next Council meeting on February 5th at 5:30 with Julie Green of the Trumbull County Planning Commission, who is coming to give Council an overview of the YARS project and will request the Village's involvement in that.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Thank you, Kellie. Does anybody have any questions for Kellie?

MR. MOSELEY: Yeah, I do. Could you explain that moratorium a little bit more. I don't think these people understand what's going on with it.

MS. BORDNER: Yes, absolutely. Contrary to some of the rumors and comments that have been going around, the moratorium at issue tonight does not apply to SAIA Trucking. In early December, the Planning and Zoning Office worked with a civil designer, an engineer in training, on behalf of BHGH, on a draft survey map and legal descriptions for subdividing out an 18-acre parcel for SAIA for the 99.38-acre parent parcel, at Parcel ID No. 45-189203. That would be sufficient enough to make the proposed moratorium inapplicable as to SAIA relative to this particular 18-acre parcel. However, in addition to that, the Planning and Zoning Office received a formal letter of intent to develop the proposed 18-acre parcel once subdivided and a zone change is accomplished for a SAIA trucking terminal. So, again, as to SAIA trucking, specifically on the proposed 18-acre subdivision from the BHGH property at the south end of Tod Avenue, the moratorium does not apply or have any affect.

MR. MOSELEY: Well, last week I ran into a SAIA representative, and he told me that they bought 17 terminals off of Yellow Trucking and they weren't coming to Lordstown because they got one in North Lima and they got one in Akron and they don't need to

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come to Lordstown.

MS. BORDNER: I did see that in the news, but I have no information—

MR. MOSELEY: I talked to the guy and that's what he told me.

MS. BORDNER: —to say it's not coming. I have no information.

MR. MOSELEY: I figured I'd tell you.

MS. BORDNER: Thank you.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Are there any other questions for Kellie?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
Parks, Grounds, Buildings, Street Superintendent, Ron Hickox?

MR. HICKOX: Thank you, Mayor. Since our last meeting, our crews have been busy. We've been cleaning up some wind damage. We had a couple trees go down and fall across—they fell from private property across our right-of-ways, and we cleaned them up and got them out of our way. We've been working on some drainage issues at various locations. We submitted a quote through the committee for the best PA system. We hope that passes tonight so we can move forward with that. We've been dispatched two times for snow and ice control. We've patched potholes in various locations. The contractor's material finally arrived, and they finished the roof on the Police Department. And at this time, the flooring is going in upstairs in the Administration offices. That's all I have.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Ron?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)
The flooring looks good upstairs. I did see it. It looks nice. Correspondence. Is there any correspondence tonight?

MR. BLANK: I believe Matt has one.

SOLICITOR RIES: I do have a letter to read. "Attention Lordstown Village Clerk, Mr. Blank: I would appreciate my written comments being read at the next Council meeting. I do not favor a moratorium being put into place regarding truck terminals. I do not know all the particulars associated with the proposed moratorium, but I take this position after reading articles in the Tribune and comments individuals have placed on the Lordstown Facebook pages. When Mahoning Valley leaders and the Regional Chamber of Commerce representatives state taking such action would hinder economic growth, I believe what they say. They are looking at the "bigger picture" of how this would impact the area. Like it or not, we are all tied together. I support any growth that would continue to add to the benefit of Lordstown residents. I have been living in the community since 2001 and fully appreciate the benefits that the Village has. Unlike neighboring communities, the Village has not had to place levies on the ballot for the police, roads, cemeteries or parks, nor has the school had to place a tax levy before voters. This is directly due to industry that has located here and benefited the Village. I would have to question how the residents would position themselves if they had to vote on these levies, especially a school levy. School levies are difficult to pass as Poland and Canfield schools can attest to.

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Lordstown has just 29 seniors and 39 juniors attending. I was surprised when I attended a Lordstown basketball game this year. I discovered the junior high had co-ed basketball and the junior varsity had to either cancel games or play limited quarters due to not having enough players.

Discourage industry and business or see industry leave this community, then we would be looking at a school levy or perhaps a school consolidation. Industry has kept this quaint village well-provided for, which is a fact some seem to forget.

I reflect back to when there was no vocational school in Trumbull County. Lordstown built the Gordon James Career Center to serve five local schools. The center was paid for in cash. Industry has treated the Village well.

The comments in the Tribune and on the Lordstown Facebook sites had me questioning and thinking of people on this proposed moratorium. One individual is quoted as complaining of truck traffic on Route 45. This makes no sense as this is a state route. Where do they expect trucks to travel? Another individual questions traffic to local industries. Any industry is going to have truck traffic. Stop industry and you will be facing the tax levies I have mentioned. I don't recall complaints on Anchor truck traffic when GM was in full operation, and Anchor trucks moved through the Village like bumble bees.

Some individuals speak of trucks travelling on residential roads, overweight trucks, and loud noise associated with the trucks. If this is true, this is an enforceable problem, and I have not heard anybody addressing enforcement. So do we or don't we have a truck enforcement problem?

I truly understand residents wanting to keep the Village as days of old, but we must acknowledge how industry has helped the Village become the place that it is. Industry has improved the quality of living and kept our tax bill down. In these inflationary times, nobody wants an increase in their taxes.

The umbilical cord of the Village is connected directly to the industry we have. If this umbilical cord is severed, it will have to be connected to the residents in the form of taxes to support what we now have. I do not want that, and I believe Council doesn't either.

Council must look at how to maximize our available space to continue to attract businesses and industry and not pass a moratorium that would discourage these entities from coming. Ronald Brown, 7414 Palmyra Road, S.W., Warren, Ohio 44481."

There's an Ordinance on the agenda tonight to adopt the waterline that the Sisters installed on North Lipkey Road. It's been a journey that we appreciate the folks here in the Village of Lordstown walking with us. Want to thank the

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Board of Public Affairs, Chris Peterson, and his colleagues, for all their hard work. They adopted a resolution today urging this Council to adopt that Ordinance. The Public Utilities, Mr. Bond, Mr. Sheely, Mr. Moseley, in the past, thank you for your support. Attorney Ries and Darren Biggs, the Water Superintendent and his crew, have worked very hard. We appreciate all your support, and we would encourage and ask for your support in adopting the Ordinance tonight. Thank you.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Are there any additional public remarks? Council remarks? I'm sorry. Go ahead, Mark.

MR. MCGRAIL: Mark McGrail, 3656 Goldner Lane, Lordstown, Ohio. First of all, I ask that you pass that Ordinance with regards to the moratorium. With regard to the comments that have been made here, in the Tribune and other places, with regard to the Ordinance preventing businesses from coming here, those have all been made without any proof. In other words, if I were to make that remark that I think this Ordinance would stop a business, I would say "because, for example." But you don't hear that from any of them. It's just misinformation.

And, in particular, trucking terminals. One of the issues that we have here is that trucking terminals—in general, not all—provide very little income tax to the Village. And that's what the Village itself thrives on. So, when you hear the comments about the benefit to the Village, there is no benefit. It takes up property that could be developed for an income-generating business.

Another issue—it's a lot more complex—but this Live Zone is primarily centered around—well, not primarily centered—but a large component of that is trucking companies. In particular, I was just reading something the other day, parking for trucks. And if you read the Live Zone proposal—I don't know if you've seen it—but it has a map in there and there's a little indicator on the map and when you look for the definition, it's a parking lot for trucks. The place where they're showing it is 160 acres. Now, I'm not saying they're planning to develop the whole thing, but what if they were? That's 160 acres we don't get taxes on, either property or—they're going to come in for an abatement, by the way, on that property. So you're going to get reduced or no property taxes. Trucks sitting idle pay no income tax. That's 160 acres. There's another hundred acres that they're looking at developing as a part of this project and it's an automated switching yard, essentially. These big trailers come in on the rail. They're picked up. Driven by a robot, automatic truck down to this switching yard and load it on to trucks that go on to the Turnpike or Rt. 76. No jobs. No income tax. That's what this moratorium is about is making sure that the Village can use and have developed the property in this Village that's zoned properly to generate as much income for the Village as possible. I ask that you vote for this moratorium. Thank you.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Any additional public remarks?

So, we have had tax levies recently, and I consider 50 percent increase in income tax as a major increase. Why we needed that? Well, that's open to debate. That's failed to be mentioned in that letter. Thank you.
