MAYOR WOODWARD: 6, ayes; 0, nays. Motion is carried.

Mayor's report. The Mobile Market is going to be coming to town on June 25, that's a Tuesday, from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. And I would hope to see lots of people there patronizing this. There is a voucher, I think it's one per household, for \$15. Those are available on a limited basis. So, patrons are still welcome to shop and use other payment methods so that they can receive groceries at market value. This is right here in our community at our doorstep. So, let's come up and check that out and see what that's all about on Tuesday, June 25. I have nothing further.

Clerk's report?

MR. BLANK: I have no report, Mayor.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Bill?

(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Solicitor's report?

SOLICITOR RIES: No report, Mayor.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Anybody have any questions for Matt?

(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Treasurer's report?

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MR. EBLING: No report.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for George?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

MAYOR WOODWARD: Board of Trustees of Public Affairs report?

MR. PETERSON: Yes, Mayor. Our regular scheduled meeting is tomorrow at 4 p.m.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have any questions for Chris?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Village Engineer's report?

MR. KOGELNIK: Mayor, I've submitted my written report to Council. Couple things that are coming up, OPWC's pre-applications for funding are coming up August 29, so going to need the department heads to talk about roads and water and sewer and that sort of thing. I'll talk to the BPA tomorrow about that.

On Monday we're going to be present to start looking at the water and sewer department building. That will be architectural code review stuff, as well as the public restroom building in the park. Does Council have any questions?

MR. LIMING: Any change on the heavy haul route?

MR. KOGELNIK: No. As far as we know, it's still the same established route.

MR. LIMING: Okay.

MR. BLANK: Chris, that No. 9 we're reading. I don't remember a work authorization.

MS. BORDNER: He hasn't signed it yet.

MR. KOGELNIK: Yeah, he's got to sign it first.

MR. BLANK: Okay. I was going to say I don't remember seeing that.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Does anybody have anything else for Chris?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Special reports. Police Chief is not here. There's nothing—he didn't send anything to you, Bill?

MR. BLANK: No.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Okay. Fire Chief Travis Eastham?

CHIEF EASTHAM: Yes, Mayor. I'd also like support on this passing of the legislation for the Silverado to replace the Suburban. It's replacing a 20-year-old vehicle that has seen better days. And it's been costing us a lot every year to keep it running. At this point, it's not really the safest vehicle right now to be driving. So, like to see that passed tonight. And the other thing I wanted to bring up is one of the reasons I didn't offer the cooling area at the Fire Station where we're at is because we're having some issues that Martin will bring up when it gets to him with our own building with the A/C unit. That's it.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Anybody have any questions for Travis?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Planning and Zoning Administrator, Kellie Bordner?

MS. BORDNER: No report, Mayor.

MAYOR WOODWARD: Anybody have any questions for Kellie?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Parks, Grounds, Buildings, Street Superintendent, Martin Nelder?

MR. NELDER: Yes. I wanted to bring up that the rooftop unit at the Fire Station is in really bad shape. I've had Western Reserve come out. He did a bunch of soldering on the pipes Friday and put freon back in. They replaced a fan and some other parts. But we're just, like, nursing it and trying to get prices on a new one. So, eventually, we're going to have to. It cools most all of the inside of the community room and bedrooms in the Fire Station.

And, also, our road-side mower, we've been doing some extensive repairs to the mower on the side. The guy spent most of the day welding it back together today. I know when Ron was here, we got approval to buy a brush hog. They told him they didn't make

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it, the one we were looking at. But a guy stopped yesterday, and he said they're making it. So, I was going to get a price and I'll present it to you. That's all I have.

MR. BLANK:

Travis, how old is that air conditioner?

CHIEF EASTHAM:

It was the original one put in in the late '80s, '84 or '85.

MR. BLANK:

Got to get it replaced.

CHIEF EASTHAM:

And every year I've watched them put a couple thousand in it. By Friday—they fixed it around 2:00 on Friday and by 8:00 my crew called me and it was like in the upper 70s, 80s. I think it froze up. Then Saturday morning, I met John James down there. We put one of those mobile portable units like they had at the Road Department, a little A/C tower. And we shut it off for, like, five or six hours and let it thaw out. It's just by 6:00, 7:00 every day it's miserable in that building.

MR. BLANK:

It needs replaced.

CHIEF EASTHAM:

And it's like that all night. In the morning, it will catch up and you're halfway decent and by evening, it's back again. I was afraid this was going to happen in the worst week of the year, it's going to die. But the pipes rub together and there was absolutely no freon in it Friday. They soldered it and redid it.

But, what I was getting at, the reason why Martin was bringing it up is I don't know what we have to do to get it fixed. We need to just figure it out.

MR. CAMPBELL:

I think we just need to get a new one. That's my opinion. Get a price on a new one, Martin, and bring it to us.

CHIEF EASTHAM:

But I don't want to drag it out half the summer to try and get it fixed.

MAYOR WOODWARD:

Does anybody have any questions for Martin?
(NO RESPONSE FROM COUNCIL.)

Correspondence?

MR. BLANK:

I have no correspondence, Mayor.

MAYOR WOODWARD:

Hearing none, Public remarks.

MR. CHAFFEE:

Michael Chaffee, 2999 Hallock-Young Road, S.W., Lordstown. Wish Brent had been here to hear me say that because I always used to say that when I called him. (Laughter.)

Again, start with, Mayor, you're doing a great job. And that's not just coming from me. That's coming from a lot of people. They like the ideas and different things. Trust me, not all of them are going to be embraced. They have complimented you on your corresponding and notices on Facebook and things. That's the world we live in. So, you're doing a great job.

MAYOR WOODWARD:

Thank you.

MR. CHAFFEE:

You bumped me from the best-looking picture, but that's okay.

(Laughter.)

MR. CHAFFEE:

I'm not here to yell and scream at anybody. But I am here to ask Council to reconsider the legislation they passed the last meeting banning all forms of marijuana in businesses and stuff from the Village.

Marijuana is going to be a gigantic industry in Ohio. You have to think beyond just the dispensary. I mean—I wrote these numbers down so I didn't screw them up—they're projecting the tax revenue in Ohio in five years will be up to \$400 million a year. And, although the legislature—I know you find this hard to believe—our legislature hasn't really worked it all the way through yet. They're trying to find another coal plant in Indiana to maybe fix first. But, in the drafts, 36 percent of that is going to go to communities with operating cannabis entities. I did the math. That would be \$144 million dollars in that pot. If we were one percent,

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we'd get \$1.4 million a year. If we were a half of a percent, we'd get \$140,000 a year. That will fix your roof, maybe, can't promise it. But, again, it's tough times. It's tough to generate. I know that and anybody that comes in they won't cut taxes, they don't want to take your taxes. We'll come in but you have to build it for us and all that. But, I think this is a great, great opportunity.

I worked the last three years prior to retiring in Middlefield. When I was Mayor, Ron Barnhart was the Planning and Zoning guy. I was always mad at him because I was like, Barnhart, Middlefield is in the middle of nowhere and they've got industry on top of industry. We're on the turnpike. And he goes they've got interstate highway access. And I was, like, no they don't. But what I learned when I was there is they're very open to business and they're open to business opportunities.

The end of my second year there, there had been a bus accident. I was, like, everybody is okay, where was it? They said it was by the marijuana plant. And, I was like, the what? They said on 528 there's a marijuana—you don't know that? There's a marijuana plant. And I had no idea. It's an 80,000 square foot building between 60 and 80 employees. They've been there for five years. They process and distribute medicinal marijuana.

I talked to the Police Chief today, who I knew up there—and he's not fishing—and he told me in five years they've had not a problem. He said they were called there one time because the alarm dropped in the middle of the night.

But I bring that up because there's going to be hundreds of those things now around the state. And we're well positioned to be a leader in that. If we just out of hand say we're not going to have anything here, I just think—and I understand why communities are doing that because they think of a dispensary as a crack house. I'm going to guess nobody has visited a dispensary, maybe you should. They're in Michigan, right over the border. But I know people who have been in dispensaries and they are—I talked to my friend, who lives in Tiffin today, what would you compare it to? He said I compare it to a liquor store. It's just like going into a liquor store. We used to have those before. They're Rite Aid now.

So, with those opportunities coming forward, I just think that it would make good sense to take a step back and do some research and see. Again, every community that is not going to have it says Lordstown's not having it. We're quoted in every article as something we're not going to have. I mean, we have land. We have access. We have—these would create jobs that would sustain. It's coming. You're out of your mind if you think it's not going to be a number one industry—well, next to tobacco.

Again, this year Michigan—sorry to bring it up, Lamar, it's been a tough couple years for Ohio State—(Laughter.) At the end of the fourth year, they had collected two thirds of a billion dollars in tax revenue. Ironically, they're in the top ten states for economy. Not ironically, if you saw the news today, we cracked the bottom ten. So, look out Mississippi, Ohio's coming. But they're going to square that away sooner or later at the Statehouse. I just think be open minded and be creative. We're a rural community. There's a lot of opportunities for a lot of people to generate money and jobs for this community. Thank you.
